When he was eight, he started to write his own book.
 On the cover, he wrote: *Peter, Mark, Roget. His Book*.
 But instead of writing stories, he wrote lists.

At first, he made a list of the Latin words
 he'd learned from his tutor.
 Next to it, he wrote their English meanings.



The lists helped him remember his lessons. They also gave him something to do when Mother peppered him with questions —

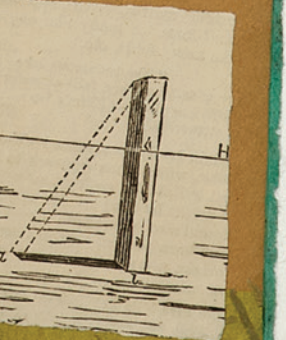
